

Exhibitions at the American Museum of Natural History

These exhibitions are included with your **General Admission** ticket option, and are open for viewing throughout the year. You don't need to make any additional purchases to explore the exhibits listed below.

1. Apex Stegosaurus Fossil

Apex is a 150-million-year-old *Stegosaurus* fossil. Measuring 11.5 feet tall and 27 feet long, it's one of the most complete and well-preserved *Stegosaurus* specimens ever discovered.



2. Extinct and Endangered: Insects in Peril, by Levon Bliss

Get a chance to see the wonderful insects that keep our ecosystems thriving in microscopic detail on a macroscopic scale. Each photograph of these 40 endangered species is made using up to 10,000 individual images.



3. Opulent Oceans

The exhibit features illustrations from explorations of European scientists from their voyages around the globe, showcasing their discovery of newfound marine life. Their journey started 400 years ago, but the beauty and knowledge from the illustrations are used and appreciated even today.



4. The Changing Museum

Visit The Changing Museum exhibit to understand more about the nuances that go into building a collaborative collection that represents and respects the culture, and its artifacts, and upholds the traditions of Indigenous peoples of the land.



5. What's in a Name?

Dive into the complexities of scientific nomenclature, with a special focus on insects, through rare books and illustrations. Make sure to see the whimsical model of a longhorn beetle and a screenprint of a rare butterfly by Andy Warhol when you visit!



6. Cosmic Splendor

Visit the Cosmic Splendor: Jewelry from the Collections of Van Cleef & Arpels exhibit to see jewelry pieces and precious objects inspired by the cosmos. See how the universe inspires to create timeless creations and wearable works of art in this dazzling showcase.



7. Eyes on the Universe

Space exploration has come leaps and bounds over the years, and this exhibit's collection of photographs showcases the beauty that lies beyond our planet. Walk across the gallery to view images captured by the Hubble Space Telescope, James Webb Space Telescope, and the Gaia mission.
